# DECEMBER-JANUARY 2019/20

'Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old.' (Matthew 13.52)

As I write, we are at the end of the Church's year, and looking to Advent, the beginning of a new year.

It always strikes me as curious that the Church should sometimes be critical of the world's anticipation of Christmas, when, relative to the world, the Church anticipates New Year in this way.

The words that form the heading to this letter are the greater part of verse 52 of Chapter 13 of St. Matthew's Gospel (Matthew 13.52):-

"And he [Jesus] said to them [his disciples], 'Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old.""

This verse comes at the end of a number of Jesus' parables. We shall be encountering St. Matthew's Gospel throughout the coming year, as the Lectionary (the list of Bible readings for our services) reverts to Year A of its 3-year cycle.

Advent itself begins by looking forward to the Second Coming of Jesus, and the focus as Advent progresses gradually shifts towards Jesus' First Coming – the Incarnation (taking of our human flesh) of Almighty God.

Across the country, there will be Carol Services. Some of these will be very traditional, and some will be modern, with modern songs replacing more traditional carols.

A few years ago, the Bishop of Derby received a written complaint about a carol service in Buxton, which looked as though it referred to St. John's Church, as the date matched. The complaint was that the service lacked traditional carols. The Bishop was rather surprised by this, not least because his own wife sang with St. John's Church Choir, and he knew what our carol service was like.

Further enquiry revealed that the complainant had been at a carol service conducted by another (non-Anglican) church in the Devonshire Dome.

The Bishop simply had to reply that he had no power or influence over that service or the people who had organised it.

There is no reason why a carol service should not be thoroughly modern. However, it is interesting that many who seldom enter a church or Christian chapel crave a service of the most traditional kind at or near Christmas. It is a unique time of year when people flock to cathedrals and seem to want to listen to carols and readings in 400-year old English.

Perhaps there is more that is speaking to them than the mere words on the page of Bible or hymn book?

When I was in my teens, I cherished what I encountered at church.

We had moved into a new house, in a parish where the population expanded in the 1950s and 1960s from about 2500 to over 25,000. My father did not at that time go to church. My mother could not drive. The result was that I can only remember going to the old parish church on a couple of occasions – until they built a "daughter church" just 5 doors along from where I lived.

My brothers and I became founder members of the church choir – at a time when services were very traditional. It was there that I became a regular worshipper. 6 months or so after the church opened, we had a parish confirmation service. About a dozen adults and 20 children were confirmed from that daughter church alone.

The language of worship seemed to be less important than its sincerity and the commitment of those present.

When I went to university, I found myself worshipping at a church in the evangelical tradition. In some ways, it did not make so much difference, as we were all using the Book of Common Prayer of 1662 (hereafter "BCP"). Some of the hymns were rather more modern – I find it strange to reflect that "100 Hymns for Today" (published as a supplement to Hymns Ancient and Modern) is now 50 years old.

The pace of liturgical reform began to speed up, and I eagerly embraced each successive change. Church attendance nationally was declining, and we needed to be up-to-date, changing and relevant in order to bring the Gospel to those outside the Church.

From time to time I hear it said that if we do same old thing, we will get the same old result – decline. This is the clarion call to yet more change and modernity.

One problem with this, it seems to me, is that the faster we have changed, the faster that we seem to have declined. Yes, new people have come in, but more seem to have left.

Have we sometimes, in our desire for change, undermined ways of worship that people had been taught to cherish?

Church initiatives come and go. They often have strap lines or slogans associated with them.

A few years ago, when I was a lay member of Oxford Diocesan Synod, we had an initiative that I had forgotten about completely until one of its headings came to mind, viz. "Sustaining the Sacred Centre". I put the phrase into an online search, and the single precise hit that it brought up was the website of a church in Reading (Reading is in Oxford Diocese).

I do not propose to define what "Sustaining the Sacred Centre" means, but it seems to me that a Church that does not give every encouragement to its people in meeting their needs and supporting and building up their faith and spiritual welfare is unlikely to thrive.

Over the last few months since she arrived here, our Team Rector-in-charge, Liz, has devoted much time, effort and prayer in seeking to identify the character and strengths of each of our 6 churches.

Liz's poems encapsulating what she sees in our churches have been made available, and she has issued a questionnaire entitled "I am interested in... $\sqrt{}$ ". If you have not seen a questionnaire, they are in the churches and the church office. Please ask for one.

We can expect change, but there will not be uniformity, and there is an expressed commitment to retain availability of worship using the BCP, for example.

As I get older, I find in myself a greater reluctance to embrace change. I need to be convinced that what is proposed is an improvement, rather than merely being different.

I have had the privilege of being involved over some years in an older people's Lunch Club Eucharist in the parish where I did my curacy. Its liturgy is relatively concise and unchanging, except for addition of some seasonal prayers.

One advantage of this is that nearly everyone can participate, and I find that as some members slip gently into dementia, they remain able to join in the worship in ways that are clearly of great comfort to them. I rather hope that such provision is available to me if and when I reach such a point in life.

'Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old.'

Do pray that as we develop and grow, we maintain our discernment in what we bring, both new and old, out of our treasure. Amen.



## CONGRATULATIONS GOOD NEWS FAMILY CARE!

John and I were privileged to attend the **25th** 

**ANNIVERSARY celebrations** of one of our local charities last Saturday. It is one the Parish supports with our giving. The Christian-run Women's Refuge is almost unique in being able to offer help to those with complex needs: victims of Domestic Abuse, with Mental health problems complicated by Drug and Alcohol and other addictions, which often lead to Homelessness.

Those most severely affected go first to work through a structured programme in the Recovery Centre, where dependent children can also be accommodated.

The next stage is the Family Centre for those with medium level support needs. There is a Nursery adjacent to the Centre, which is open to the local community as well.

Those in the Community are also supported with a Community Drop In, a Creative Wellbeing group and Thursday church.

The farm-based Work-skills Project operates for clients across all services, on weekdays.

Since 1994, GNFC has supported approximately **3,400** people!

The charity, in Hazel's words, has "so much to thank God for". Not least for its survival! In 2010, when government funding was cut dramatically, **one in six refuges closed.** 

**Demand** is greater than ever, and the level of violence experienced by individuals is increasing.

We cannot let this wonderful work die. Hazel asks for younger volunteers, funding and above all, prayer.



#### The Rt Revd Libby Lane, Bishop of Derby writes...



December always feels a bit frantic to me. And this year the unusual timing of a General Election only adds to that. Whatever else we might think of this election, perhaps its timing during Advent will encourage us to take a wider perspective and longer view.

We try to make Advent visible in our household: we decorate the house, but gently (we change decoration on Christmas Eve in celebration); each Sunday we light a candle on an Advent wreath; we put up the traditional pine or spruce, but until Christmas Eve it is a Jesse Tree, softly lit, hung daily with simple olive wood images depicting salvation history through the stories of God's people in the Bible. These are outward reminders to us that the season of Advent is not simply a countdown to turkey and tinsel.

It's not that I think we just ought to replace one kind of outward display with another more pious. And I'm not a grinch. I enjoy the hospitality of the run up to Christmas. I admire the ways people find time and resource to focus on family and friends – I'm not very good at present finding, but my (now grown up) children have the knack of identifying often small, inexpensive or home-made gifts that are just right and show an attentiveness that's not just turned on for Christmas. These things can also be outward reminders of important and precious things – of love and hope and desire.

And Advent should be full of desire: 'come, Lord Jesus ... even so, come'.

That desire is, I think, wonderfully subversive. This season, if taken seriously, strips away all self-reliance. If we allow it to, the eternal hopeful themes of the season can reveal the lack of substance in the relentless consumerism of the public face of the approach to Christmas – and this year, perhaps, undercut the hubris of political manoeuvring. Amid all the noise and activity of December, Advent is the thundering silence of God, putting all our striving to shame, reminding us that we cannot save ourselves nor, in the end, hide from God.

Advent offers a perspective that reverses and upturns the views we too easily accept. It takes courage to journey through Advent. There is no hiding, no wrapping the truth up with ribbon and baubles, or indeed with election promises and campaign spending.

The extraordinary, outrageous mercy of Advent is the discovery that, as we yearn for Christ's coming – in both humility and glory – we discover that God has always risked trusting the outworking of salvation to the stuff of creation and to human flesh.

There is only one thing that prevents The gentle movement, heaven into earth: Not the fear that godly greeting brings, Nor cold presumption (God could never speak), Nor empty tomb, nor barren heart, Nor eyes searching, voices how long blaze, Nor the silence where there should be praise, Nor the bitter taste of human failing: But the lack of trust that what was promised Might in human flesh be born, achieved, How happy she who for us all believed, Strength of God in human weakness blending, Tenderly the humble servant lifted, From foetal cry the fatal mending.

#### Derby Churches Nightshelter

Working with an army of volunteers, the nightshelter provides safe accomodation and a substantial meal for up to 35 guests each night during the coldest months of the year (December - March).

Seven churches in or near the city centre provide a welcoming venue, each opening their doors for one night each week.

As guests bed down for the night in new, warm sleeping bags and blankets, night staff are there to offer support and prayer throughout the night.

Before leaving at 8am the next morning, guests tuck into a healthy breakfast of cereals, toast and fresh fruit. Many are given ongoing support to address their needs.
